The Board of Commissioners met in an agenda session with Mayor Quinn presiding. Members present. Quinn, Derella, Shannon, Parent and Vanaman. Absent: None.

Mayor Quinn made the statement required by the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975.

"This meeting is being conducted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975", was advertised, posted and made available to the public as required by Statute. The Municipal Clerk is directed to include a statement in the minutes of this meeting.

The tentative agenda was discussed, but no official action was taken.

The City Clerk/Administrator noted additions to the agenda, including correspondence regarding the 31st Annual Olympic Day Parade and correspondence from the Director of Revenue and Finance, Joseph Derella concerning Report of Bids for Notes.

The City Clerk/Administrator also noted an addition to the agenda concerning approval for purchase of a VOIP Recording System for the Millville Police Bureau in the amount of \$36,747.00.

The City Clerk/Administrator also noted additions to the agenda regarding Report of Public Auction and Report from Adolf Tarasevich regarding Disposal and Placement of a 2" Media for Well No. 17.

The City Clerk/Administrator also noted a report regarding the City of Millville Polling Place Location changes for the school, primary and general elections.

Commissioner Shannon reported on the forthcoming Walkathon, Tree Dedication for Patrolman Carmen DeGregorio, the continuation of the Zumba Classes and the Holly City Striders and the forthcoming Annual Youth Week Activities sponsored by the Elk's beginning on April 27th.

Mayor Quinn made the following comments concerning a bogus flyer:

"I have a few things I'm going to address. The bogus flyer that was sent to every single resident of the City of Millville, which is absolutely factless. We're going to talk about that tonight. I also have some information from the people that bought Williams to give the true facts of what's happening. It just amazes me someone could spend thousands and thousands of dollars on a flyer and be unknown, not sign it, nobody knows who

sent it and yet put out all of this information that has probably caused my secretary and I, with no lie, at least 8 hours of aggravation of returning calls of the threatening letter that I've received from the people, if you don't do the right thing and all this kind of stuff. When, in fact, this entire flyer was bogus, but you know what if we see it, we read it, we believe it, it's gospel. In this case it wasn't gospel, it was hogwash, but you know, it's sad, because of the time that has to be spent and all the things that have to be done when you have this type of stuff that's sent out. It's just amazing, but this is America, I guess you can send out whatever you want, you don't have to sign, you don't have to tell who it is and maybe that was their own blog they were sending it out on paper.

On the positive side, yesterday we hosted 40 people from all over the United States for the National Main Street Conference that's being held currently in Philadelphia, I attended yesterday and Sunday, Lew Thompson and many other people from the City have been there and some are still there as it's going on. One of the things that I am very proud of, The National Main Street Conference, the booklet that was given to every attendee, there are three pictures on the front of the booklet, Philadelphia, Philadelphia and Millville, New Jersey. So, this is, I think says something about our downtown, The Arts District, this picture is one that's in the 100 block of High Street and the people who came loved what we had going on down here, the people from all over the United States, I'm sure you probably read the paper this morning about that. We're very, very impressed we got very high ratings from the people about the tour and how much they enjoyed it. The other positive thing tonight is we're going to discuss, Lauren VanEmbden, who is the Co-Chair, along with Father Phillip will be here this evening, I have something to present to her and they'll talk about the marriage of the off-Broad Street Players and the Levoy Theatre Preservation Society as a way of getting the movie theatre moving along and hopefully getting it open within about 18 months to two years, so that's everything we have this evening."

Mayor Quinn asked if there were any comments concerning the proposed agenda items from the public.

Jeff Davis of Agate Construction addressed the Board of Commissioners and made the following comments:

"Thank you for the time, my name is Jeff Davis, I'm with Agate Construction, we are currently constructing Contract 1 in the Waterfront Park over there. My questions are specifically in regard to Resolution No. A- 6076 for award of the construction contract for Contract 2 for that program. We were a bidder on that project and based on the bid analysis there are scenarios where Agate Construction is low on that project, based on the base bids and alternates that are available to award by the City. So, my first question is, I see that this is scheduled to be awarded to Spark Construction tonight, my first question, was the scenario with base bids and alternates where Agate was low at approximately \$360,000.00 given consideration and to what extent."

Commissioner Shannon: "Yes, we looked at the bid analysis from the Engineering Department and he gave us a couple case scenarios. One was looking at the approximate 360 bid with the contribution of approximately \$11,000.00. After thorough review and looking at the project, we have money in hand, Federal money that would pay for the \$348,000.00 and we felt, and I felt to

recommend no contribution to the contract to award at the higher amount. So, we went with the low bid to get that within the monies that we have."

Mr. Davis: "Okay, it's understood. I understand the funding limit was \$350,000.00, correct?"

Commissioner Shannon: "Correct."

Mr. Davis: "From New Jersey Federal Aid Transportation Enhancement Program?"

Commissioner Shannon: "yes..."

Mr. Davis: "and I believe under those guidelines, the project should be functionally complete at the completion of the contract. It is our belief that the electrical portions that are deleted from the scope of work in order to award the contract to Spark, leave you an unfinished project. You'll have lights out there, but they will not be operational, because certain portions of the electrical system that power the lights will be deleted if that is awarded to Sparks..."

Commissioner Shannon: "and from the recommendation of the Engineer that would be picked up in the 3rd Phase, because we wouldn't have a complete project adding the \$11,000.00 anyway in the Engineer's estimate in talking to him."

Mr. Davis: "Right, you would have a functional bridge with a landing and lights, if the contract were awarded for \$360,000.00..."

Commissioner Shannon: "Correct, that's with adding funds..."

Mr. Davis: "correct."

Commissioner Shannon: "and we didn't want to use any additional funds."

Mr. Davis: "Well, looking at the electrical numbers, if you add the \$10,000.00 to the contract now, based on the numbers that Sparks submitted for the electrical package, he's showing that it's going to cost \$32,000.00 later under his bid scenario..."

Commissioner Derella: "you got to understand with the time that this bid was put out we didn't have the funds for Phase III, which now we do and it's the estimation of Revenue and Finance after we've looked at this thing, probably five separate times inside and out having meetings with the staff and Engineering Department along with Commissioner Shannon and myself that right now our projection is the funds coming in for Phase III will cover the cost of that electric, as well as finishing the project. So, it was my recommendation from Revenue and Finance after looking at all these big numbers that why would we want to spend money from other sources from the City of Millville when potentially we wouldn't have to do that at all going through Phase I, II and III..."

Mr. Davis: "well, can't the funds for Contract III be used for that in order to get the competitive price now, rather than wait and see later..."

Commissioner Derella: "Our estimation as we have done at that time, yes, we think that because of the way the construction is going and everything else, we will have a completed project. We didn't know when Phase III was going to, when we were going to get funded on it, that came in, we know what we're getting, I believe it's a hundred and eighty-seven or..."

Commissioner Shannon: "\$187,000.00..."

Mr. Davis: "\$187,000.00..."

Commissioner Derella: "to go to Phase III, our estimated cost of that is approximately, we should be able to cover everything that is involved. We did not want to take a chance and spend taxpayer money and then turn grant money back at the end of the project..."

Mr. Davis: "Well, can't the Phase III funds be moved to Contract 2 in order to complete the work under Contract 2?"

Commissioner Derella and Richard McCarthy: "No."

Commissioner Shannon: "it was my understanding that no you cannot do that."

Commissioner Derella: "we can defer that to our attorney, because they were some of the options we looked at."

Richard McCarthy: "The decision to allocate, the decision to allocate resources to a project over and above what is already dedicated by grant money is a discretionary act of the governing body, which they can decide to do or not to do. That's the decision that they are going to vote on and basically because of that they do not want to dedicate taxpayer dollars, as previously stated. The report from the Engineer Department indicated that there would be a seamless transition anyway, because we weren't going to open up that bridge until the 3rd Phase was done in light of the fact of that the seamless transition, the issue concerning the remaining electrical, which was carefully reviewed by Commissioner Derella and Commissioner Shannon as part of the Engineering analysis is a non-issue from our standpoint, because we don't intend to use that until Phase III is done."

Mr. Davis: "Okay, thank you."

There being no further comments the agenda session was adjourned, subject to the call of the chair, by the following vote: Yeas: Shannon, Parent, Derella, Vanaman and Quinn.

Bank of America was the successful low bidder with a low net interest cost of 1.98 for notes maturing September 26, 2008 and 1.90% for notes maturing December 11, 2008 was ordered, received and filed, by the following vote: Yeas: Shannon, Parent, Derella, Vanaman and Quinn.

The monthly Activity Fire Report for the month of February was ordered, received and filed, by the following vote: Yeas: Shannon, Parent, Derella, Vanaman and Quinn.

Director Vanaman presented a Proclamation to retired Acting Chief Thomas Riley for his 26 years of dedicated service to the City of Millville and for his professionalism and achievements in serving as a Patrolman, Sergeant, Lieutenant, Captain and Acting Chief of Police before his retirement on April 1, 2008.

Mayor Quinn made the following comments:

"I've got several things, the first one is one that's puzzling, but it happens. Many of you have received, in fact

everyone of you, if you live in the 08332 zip code, whether you live in Commercial Township, Deerfield Township or anywhere in Maurice River Township, you got one of these flyers. It is absolutely amazing in this, well, I guess it's freedom of speech, you can send a flyer, you don't have to identify who you are when you send a flyer, there is absolutely no indication, I even called the bulk rate stamp person, who had the bulk rate stamp, it happened to being Ralph Trout Printing. I said, "Mr. Trout, is it permissible for me to ask you who sent this flyer to every resident in the City of Millville." He said, "I don't know, they came in an unmarked pickup truck and dropped off thousands of dollars of cash." Now, what does that tell you about the person who sends this or whatever group sent this, obviously. It tells you that they've got some kind of axe to grind with Williams Paving who sold their business to Stavola. But, I got to tell you also, my secretary and I have spent hours and hours and hours and I've received the veiled threats and threats and threats, you know, you better stop this or you're not going to get elected again and all those type of things. You know, that's fine, but the thing is it's all bogus, there is nothing in this flyer that has any resemblance of reality, because they've never come and we've met with the owners, Don Ayres and I met with them and they came down, the man's name was Rick Young, a wonderful person, he said Mayor we have not gone to the Zoning Board, we've not gone to Planning Board, we're not asking for anything, we're not, all we want to do is get our foot in the door in the Cumberland County area, because we feel it's a big growing area and you know, that's all we want to do and to operate, it was Austin T. Hills plant, it was there probably 50 years ago. The problem we run into and Bruce Eastmont when he owned it addressed it as well, when you have that type of a plant and then you start having housing built up closer and closer to an industrial park plant it causes some problems. In fact, Commissioner Derella and I on the Planning Board made sure when the last guy built the homes, we said we want you to put in the deeds that this plant has been here for 50 years, your home has been here for 50 days, so please realize you're opting to locate near a plant like this. The positive side of this is Mr. Stavola's representative, Mr. Young told Don Ayres and I that he would actually like to get a piece of land in our Industrial Park with rail siding and eventually move to a larger facility so that he knows this facility is limited. So, it is sad, because people believe what they get in the mail, they believe what they read in the paper to be gospel and obviously most of what you read in the paper is gospel, to you three wonderful reporters, correct? Do you believe that, it would say we're fools, yeah, there you go, but the flyer is absolutely just, you know, something to cause trouble, get people concerned and all of that. The man did tell me, with the maximum, the number of trucks they could probably get in and out in the day if they were running full capacity would be about 80 and that is, you know, not 600 that was put in the flyer. There's a little difference between 80 and 600. But, just to tell you, please ladies and gentlemen when you get an unsigned, unmarked, you know, no letterhead flyer, please just take it, rip it up, throw it in the circular file and forget about it, because it's not true and yet we've been doing this for, you know, the last couple of weeks. Now, let's move to some positive things. First of all, while we're talking about the Stavola people, he said to me Mayor, he said, oh, by the way he did report that only one North Jersey person, a guy from Barnegat is actually going to move down here, he's going to hire about 10 people from Millville, so there will be jobs available,

he's keeping the existing Williams employees who are from the Cumberland County area, he wanted me to also express that. He said what can I do to help Millville and I said you know there's a wonderful young lady named Lauren VanEmbden and her father who's a nice man too and the two of them got together, we worked together, all three of us did and we were able to put together a dream marriage of one of the best groups of theatrical people in Cumberland County, the Off-Broad Street Players, who have I think 700 people on your mailing list alone. They draw thousands of people for their events, if you've never seen one, they're very, very talented and very, very good in what they do and they've been renting a facility at Bridgeton High School and different places around. We thought, you know we have the Levoy Theatre, it's sort of like, just stagnated a bit and we got together with the Levoy Theatre Preservation Society, George Walter, Amanda Page, Jeff Page with Joe Pierce's blessing and certainly Phil and Lauren VanEmbden and we came up with a marriage that the two groups are now joined as a Levoy Theatre Preservation Society, there's an 8 person board, including the three people I mentioned and 3 people from Off-Broad Street Lauren and Phil VanEmbden. At this time I would like to call Lauren up and I want to present you, this is the new people coming in, they gave me a check to give to Lauren VanEmbden for the Levoy Theatre Preservation Society to kickoff your fundraising for \$5,000.00."

Lauren VanEmbden, Broad Street Players, made the following comments:

Thank you Mayor Quinn and thank you Stavola Management Company. I have been given a few minutes just to give you a little bit of information. Jim did a really good job of introducing the project, I just want to say that all of the planning phase started back in November of last year when I realized that I was performing with a group that was still acting out of a high school, but had grown way too big for the four walls that it was stuck in and I know the Levoy Preservation Society was sort of at an impasse with some impediments they were dealing with that I thought if we could bring the forces of these two positive groups together maybe we could have like the perfect union and that's really what's happened. So, we are very excited, it's the 100th Anniversary of the building and we've started a grass roots campaign, we haven't done any mass mailers yet. We've only just put the word out on the street, word of mouth, we've had a couple, we had a night, a Third Friday Night that was very, very positive, we've gotten nothing but good responses back and we have nearly a thousand signatures of support already, because our campaign is not about raising money, it's about raising awareness that this project is something that could be hugely beneficial to the entire community and I know that most of you are probably from Millville, but it's going to be so far reaching that I don't think anyone really understands just how dramatic this project is really going to be. Our plans are to cooperate with the downtown Arts District, we have programs where we're going to incorporate the galleries and let them have art displays in our lobby. We're going to tie in with the restaurants and do dinner theatre option, dinner and a theatre, dinner and a show, prefix menu's, which will bring more traffic to the area for both the restaurants as well as the artists, which should be good for everyone and it gives people locally something to do entertainment wise. We also want to cooperate with the racetrack and we have definite plans to incorporate the school

system into the project, so that we can continue to educate, which is part of what the Off-Broad Street Players group does. They do children's theatres and children's workshops and they are extremely invested in the youth, which would be something really positive for Millville students..."

Mayor Quinn: "are you going to introduce your people?"

Mrs. VanEmbden: "yes, I would like to. If you don't mind standing up, these are four of the Board Members from the Off-Broad Street players and George, do you want to stand up too? George Walter, is one of the Levoy Preservation Society members, one of the people that kept the building alive for the last 13 years, even though it was at the mercy of naysayers maybe for a few moments. Nancy Bellow, she's our V.P. of Music; Janet Christy, who is our Treasurer, you might know Christy's Funeral Home, she's actually a relative. Kathy Powers our V.P. of Productions and Robin Wood, who is our President. I just want to end on a positive note with what Mayor Quinn has said already, but this is a marriage of two groups, the Levoy, who needed the life that the theatre group is going to bring to the project, the energy, the backing of 700 members, the 200 current active participants and Off-Broad Street Players, we desperately needed a building and needed someone to believe in them and Mayor Quinn said we open our doors to you and this is shaping up to be one of the most dynamic entertainment venues South Jersey will see for a long-time. So, my plea is not for your money, but for your signature and we have forms up here, which is going to ask you if you think this is a good project and this is something that might benefit even one person in the area, I ask you please to give us your vote of confidence and just sign one of the forms up here and you can leave it on the table and we'll have somebody collect it, or if you want to take it or take five and have somebody you know sign one, that would be great too. One last thing you can visit the website: www.levoy.org and I thank you for your consideration."

Mayor Quinn: "Thank you Lauren. I would like to tell you Robin Wood is a good friend of mine, she's a councilwoman in Shiloh and you're one of the first women ever I think in Shiloh..."

Mrs. Woods: "you have to understand I sit on the board with all male friends guys, old men, I'm the only women. But, I just wanted to mention that we are thrilled at the prospect of the Levoy Theatre. It gives us a great opportunity, we are a wonderful Theatre Group, we've been in existence, this is our 11th year and we've never had a home and we offer full entertainment, we even have a pit orchestra. We're this close to being a regional theatre, so we do have the draw, in the last three years we have progressed from doing small theatre, say in a fire hall, to the stage of the Bridgeton High School, which if anybody has ever been there it's huge, it's a big venue. But, the other thing I wanted to mention, if you have any questions or if you want to get a little more familiar with us you can visit our website at www.obsponline.org. All of our contact numbers are on there."

Mayor Quinn: "Thank you Robin, we appreciate it, thank you very much. One final thing while we're staying on good things. Yesterday was the, well actually Sunday, the National Main Street Conference opened in Philadelphia and we had 40 people here, and I'm sure if you read the paper or watched NJN News you

saw about the people coming down. They loved Millville, they were from all over the United States, but what I thought was interesting, Lew Thompson and I were looking at the booklet that they put out. This went to every single participant who's in Philadelphia right now and there are three pictures on the front of the booklet two are Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and this one right down here is Millville, New Jersey. So, we were very proud, we were proud as a peacock that, you know, we were shown and talked about and the people gave us rave reviews yesterday on the tour. So, that really worked out well. Now, let's get back to business."

The following proposed ordinance was read on first reading:

Bond Ordinance to authorize Capital Expenditures for public purposes to appropriate the sum of \$825,000.00 to pay the cost thereof, to authorize the issuance of bonds to finance the appropriation and to provide for the issuance of bond anticipation notes in the anticipation of the issuance of bonds for the following:

A. Land: Acquire 4.37 acres of vacant land from South Wade Realty, Inc., which is adjacent to S. 15th Street Municipal Complex, particularly described as Block 489, Lot 10 for a purchase price of \$175,000.00

B. Capital Improvements: Construct capital improvements to various public buildings and grounds under the jurisdiction of the Parks and Public Property, including a new roof and related improvements for the Millville Historical Society building for an estimated cost of approximately \$190,000.00

C. Motor Vehicle: Purchase a 2008 or 2009 4-Wheel Drive Utility Vehicle comparable in type to a Suburban Utility Vehicle for the Municipal Engineering Department for an estimated cost of approximately \$34,000.00

D. Fire House: Purchase 3,000 feet of standard fire hose for the Millville Fire Department for an estimated cost of approximately \$16,000.00

E. Cameras and Laptop Computers: Purchase approximately eighteen (18) cameras and laptop computers and all related accessories and equipment necessary to implement the system for the Millville Police Department for an estimated cost of approximately \$300,000.00

F. Security Cameras and Recognition Camera: Purchase security cameras and related equipment for municipal buildings and a license plate recognition camera for the street sweeper for an estimated cost of approximately \$40,000.00

G. Equipment: Purchase an Asphalt Roller a/k/a Vibratory Compactor together with related accessories for the Streets and Roads Department for an estimated cost of approximately \$30,000.00

The total appropriation described above includes in the aggregate the sum of \$40,000.00 which is estimated for the expenses authorized by the Local Bond Law (NJSA 40A:2-20).

It should be cautioned and we need to make sure we follow our advice from our attorney in regards to as we go through this, because this could be precedent setting in regards to the procedure. We are attempting to do something, again at a cutting edge, that other municipalities have not and again we're moving in a positive direction I think, because of the outcry of the neighborhood. But, again as we move this process we want to make sure we pay close attention to all the details and especially of our legal representation Mr. McCarthy."

Commissioner Parent: *"Again, Mr. Mayor I just want to remind everybody, I believe that's a 5 o'clock meeting, so we encourage the public to please attend, I think it would be important."*

Richard McCarthy: *"Let me just add one thing to the comments that were just made. This is a judicial type proceeding, I will be presenting the case on behalf of the City. The defense council will be there defending the Millville Garden owners. I don't know whether any other council will be there representing the bank or otherwise, but with respect to that I would indicate that I won't be giving advice to the Commissioners in this regard, because I'll be prosecuting the matter in the sense like a plaintiff would be in a court and the defense counsel would be defending like a defense attorney would be doing in court. Consequently, presumably at some point they'll be some trial briefs or something presented by respective counsel concerning the statutes of how they operate and how the ordinance operates and you will act in the judicial capacity meaning you will be making a determination based on your experience and prior proceedings, although this will be much more complicated than you would be use to. This will be a proceeding that is a judicial nature and if the governing body wanted an attorney to be present to give them advice, it would have to be someone other than the City Attorney to do that, because I can't wear two hats during these proceedings."*

Commissioner Parent: *"We understand that Rich, but if anybody can wear two hats, you can..."*

Richard McCarthy: *"This will be a fair and open and partial hearing that objectively is decided by the Commissioners in judicial capacity and the attorney will be in an adversary type of proceeding. So, consequently you will weigh what they have to say literally and by way of argument and if the Board feels the need to have independent advice, there are other attorneys available that can do that."*

Commissioner Parent: *"thank you."*

Richard McCarthy: *"such as the Assistant City Attorney."*

The City Clerk/Administrator read a Report regarding the relocation of various City of Millville Polling Place location changes effective for the School, Primary and General Elections for 2008 moving the polling places from Millville Senior High School to the Millville Thunderbolt Club and from Berry Hall to the Millville Thunderbolt Club and from Rieck Avenue School to Saint John Bosco Church.

Mayor Quinn stated we have now reached the public comment portion of our meeting. Anyone who would like to address the commission, please go to the podium, state your name, and address your concerns. Please limit your comments to approximately 5 minutes:

Patrolman Richard Kott addressed the Board of Commissioners as a representative of the Millville PBA Local No. 213 and made the following comments:

Rick Kott: *"Mayor and Commissioners my name is Rick Kott, I'm a Millville resident and I'm also a representative for the Police Benevolent Association Local 213, Millville Police Department. The Millville Police Supervisor's Association and PBA Local 213 would like to reiterate that we strongly oppose the Acting and Provisional appointments recently made by the City of Millville. There are active lists with extremely qualified candidates that are very capable of fulfilling the several vacant promotional positions within the Police Department and that these candidates were not qualified to hold such a position they would have failed the strenuous testing procedures set forth by the New Jersey Department of Personnel. With that being said we question the City's true intention behind such moves. In a recent statement by Director Vanaman he related that we should and I quote, "study for all important upcoming examination". The candidates on the existing promotional list have done just that Director, however they are still not being promoted permanently. Director Vanaman also stated the citizens of Millville expect and deserve to have the most qualified, well trained, professional Police Department that we can give them and in this aspect Director, we could not agree with you more. However, how can you justify a promotion two grades higher of a candidate that didn't even place on the administrative test above his rightful rank. This is not a popularity contest. Although the candidate is very capable ????? label supervisor, but what makes him more qualified than any current Lieutenant we now have. They have all passed the State of New Jersey Department of Personnel test for their position, in fact one achieved the highest test score in the State of New Jersey, not to mention his Masters Degree in Criminal Justice. Our ambitions are providing the citizens with*

the service they deserve and once again the City has interfered with our efforts. That Acting Provisional appointment should be made permanent for those who are on such current promotional list. The City needs definitive and permanent leadership, by the City ignoring these lists and manipulating the promotional process, they destroyed morale throughout the entire Department. This displays poor leadership in our elected City Commission and hampers effectiveness of our real mission. We are eager to serve the citizens, however this City continues to stifle our efforts with their continual obstructions. We are asking that the City do the right thing, let the Police Department move forward. Thank you."

Mayor Quinn: "Thank you Rick."

Joe Sutherland, Millville Municipal Alliance Committee Coordinator reported on the forthcoming Millville Municipal Alliance activities at the Millville Senior High School and their preparation for the Project Graduation and SAAD Programs.

Brian McGahhey addressed the Board of Commissioners and made the following comments:

"Good evening, Brian McGahhey, Plum Street. I got a couple of questions on the bond ordinance on first reading, 4.37..."

Commissioner Shannon: "Brian, I'm sorry..."

Mayor Quinn: "you'll have an opportunity when it goes to public hearing..."

Brian McGahhey: "I know that, but you know what, that's two weeks from now and it'll be too late by then..."

Mayor Quinn: "I don't know, if we can, are we allowed to discuss this..."

Richard McCarthy: "It's the public comment portion, we don't do it on the agenda, but they can comment on anything during the public comment..."

Mayor Quinn: "Alright, Brian, go ahead..."

Commissioner Shannon: "Brian, did you say, where were you going again, just so I could get..."

Brian McGahhey: "I was just going to ask some questions about it..."

Commissioner Shannon: "which one, the bond did you say..."

Brian McGahhey: "yeah, the bond, yeah..."

Commissioner Shannon: "okay."

Brian McGahhey: "the 4.37 acres of vacant land. What's that for, that you're buying for \$175,000.00"

Commissioner Shannon: "That is property adjacent to the 15th Street property out there and that is an area in which we would like to use in the future for a possible substation for the Fire Department and also expanding the total acreage out there for ????? and various other uses..."

Brian McGahhey: *"it's for City use then..."*

Commissioner Shannon: *"to combine the use of the Road Department and the Recreation Department."*

Brian McGahhey: *"Alright. Let's see here, \$19,000.00 for Capital Improvements, \$190,000.00; \$34,000.00 for a 4-wheel drive vehicle; \$16,000.00 for 3000 feet of hose. The cameras and the laptop computers to purchase approximately 18 cameras and laptop computers..."*

Commissioner Vanaman: *"they're for the Millville Police Department..."*

Brian McGahhey: *"just 18 of them?"*

Commissioner Vanaman: *"we have some already, we're adding to the fleet..."*

Brian McGahhey: *"at \$300,000.00, you divide that by 18, that's \$16,666.66 a piece..."*

Mayor Quinn: *"it's for each car..."*

Brian McGahhey: *"that's pretty expensive laptops..."*

Commissioner Derella: *"that's for the car...go ahead Dave, you got it..."*

Commissioner Vanaman: *"that's for the cars to be able to do wireless, so I mean they're not cheap..."*

Brian McGahhey: *"yeah, it sounds it, yeah..."*

Commissioner Vanaman: *"and they're very much needed."*

Brian McGahhey: *"okay, and Commissioner Vanaman you asked a question about the license plate recognition and of course the \$40,000.00 that it's going to cost to do this. My question is, I want you guys to go home tonight and ask yourself in light of today's economy with the fuel prices the way they are, the food prices going up, the taxes that are astronomical, the Abbott Districts, we don't know what's happening, is it wise to indebt this City more in bonds? You know, I just want you to ask yourselves tonight when you go home and think about that for the next two weeks."*

Mayor Quinn: *"Anyone else?"*

Joe Flickinger addressed the Board of Commissioners and urged everyone to please vote in favor of the School Budget and support education.

Commissioner Shannon and Commissioner Vanaman each extended sincere appreciation to the Parks and Public Property Department and Millville Police Department for the joint effort in completing the curb painting project.

There being no further comments the meeting was adjourned subject to the call of the chair, by the following vote. Yeas: Shannon, Parent, Derella, Vanaman and Quinn.
