Mayor Quinn stated we have now reached the public comment portion of our meeting anyone who would like to address the commission please go to the podium, state your name, address your concerns and please limit your comments to approximately 5 minutes.

JoAnn Gardner addressed the Board of Commissioners and made the following comments:

*"JoAnn and Herman Gardner, 35 Churchill Drive, we want to know if all the laws of Millville are for all the people. Does Laurel Lake have to abide by the rules of Millville? Does the code 30-138-D added 12-07-2004 by Ordinance #42-2004 apply to only certain people? We both drive school buses, we only bring them home during our runs, which is 3 hours a day, they are not home during the evening or on weekends. On September 7, 2005 we received a citation for parking our 2 buses on our property. On September 15<sup>th</sup> we went to court and pleaded not-guilty to the charge. I had previously spoken to Patrolman Rabbai and was told that I was allowed to park the buses on our property. In court, the Zoning Official, Tom Ayres told the Judge a copy of this new code 30-138-D was sent to us, as well as our employer of the new laws that had been passed. This was not true neither us, nor our employer received a copy of the new codes. I later had this code sent to me, which I have a copy. We were fined \$133.00, I have a copy of my bank statement saying that this was paid. First, we were told we could park on our property and secondly we were not informed of this new code, we spoke to Mr. Ayres privately after court. We showed him pictures of the buses that were currently around town, especially the one that sits on the corner of Sharp and Cooper. The law for the school buses parked on City streets had been in affect for several years before this new Ordinance passed about no school buses on private property. But, yet the bus on Sharp and Cooper has parked on the street for better than 10 years and continues to park there day, night and weekends with no consequences, after we showed Mr. Ayres the pictures, he*

said "I'm glad you showed me these I will get right on it". Time went on buses continued to be parked around town, we called the Police Station and reported a bus parked on a street at the corner of Sharp and Cooper, the patrolman that answered the phone said well we will send a patrol car out there, time went on, the bus continued to park at Sharp and Cooper. We called Mr. Ayres personally to report the bus parked at Sharp and Cooper and he said sharply "I'll get on it" and then hung up on us. Presently, there are buses that are parked on a daily bases at 712 West Main, Corner of Sharp and Cooper, 1406 West Main, Corner of Main and Brown, 109 North 9<sup>th</sup> Street, Corner of South 2<sup>nd</sup> and Peek, Adams Street and there are 2 buses parked at Union Lake next to the Recreation Center. We understand that the bus at 109 North 9<sup>th</sup> Street, the driver's husband is a Millville Police Officer, also the bus at the corner of Sharp and Cooper, her husband is the Chief of the Millville Rescue Squad. We would like to know if you have a family member employed by the City of Millville that you are part of the good ole boys club and you get favoritism as to the rules and codes of the City, apparently Mr. Ayres is in this club and exempts his buddies wives from these codes we have talked to him twice, nothing is done, we have called the Police Department, nothing is done, appears Mr. Ayres can not handle the job the City is paying him to do as Zoning Officer of Millville, it appears he only has time to give citations to people who are not part of his good ole boys club. We are asking for a written statement, stating that we have permission to bring our 2 buses home during the day for 3 hours. We have spoken to our neighbors around us, they have no problem and have given us their permission, our buses on our property does not bother or disturb them. If these buses are continued to be allowed to be parked at various places around town we would like our \$133.00 back."

Mr. Bell made the following comments:

"Well, I'm back, Arnold Bell, from Millville Gardens as everybody know, I was here on a meeting before making out complaints. I attended the meeting at the Community Center 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward, I was also interviewed by the Atlantic City Press after the management received copies of these papers and faxed them to Parsippany to the owners of Millville Gardens. I received a letter from their attorney stating I guess why repairs were delayed is due to the fact I wasn't letting their maintenance person into the unit, which is false. Basically, what I see what they are trying to do is pass more less pass the buck, because the City is getting on them about various things. So, therefore why we haven't made Mr. Bell repairs, because he doesn't understand, which is false. You can't let nobody in that's not there at all, period. Since then, the maintenance person that made that false allegation has been terminated the following day. After I received this letter here, okay, also I would like to invite the individual that came to my apartment out again, I want them to see what was hidden behind the wall. The, whatever you want to call this, some type of plaster they put on the wall they were ordered to tear it down. There's a great big hole in the wall, maybe the size of this podium in diameter that the guy who made the complaint against me left the hole in the wall when I kept complaining that it was not correctly fixed and my complaints were legitimate. Also, I would like to speak, for myself along with these people here sitting in the back row, we live on corners, okay, on corners and we catch the devil from the teenagers. Very disrespectful, the destruction of private property, destruction of, well I don't own property, but my flowers and all look like crap. Mr. Charles here, which he will get up and speak and I watch the teenagers destroy the windows in his garage day in day out he asked them over and over again politely to leave. They tell him what to kiss, we going to do this, we going to do that, flatten the

peoples tires I mean you name it. You know, we, something needs to be done to get, you know, these teenagers some type of help or put them some place they need to be so they'll leave people alone. You know, basically, I don't know what to say about this mess, it's terrible and summer coming up and anybody who knows, especially Millville Gardens, every summer there's ????? which don't make no sense. Like I said something here needs to be done, the owners of the property has continuously turned their heads to the problem there. They fabricated that there has been not one complaint against Millville Gardens and it's even in the paper. I have the paper still at home and it's never been a complaint nobody has ever complained about nothing out there, everything is okay out there okay, which is false. You know something has to be done and I would like to ask the City Commissioners, Inspectors or whoever, they need to really crack down on these people we're getting tired, very, very tired.

Mayor Quinn "We assure you Mr. Bell we are working very hard on that today. Vice-Mayor Derella and I were in a meeting to address the Millville Gardens situation and we are staying on it very much so. I also want to tell you that I saw Charles' broken windows today, because we had a ground breaking right next door across the street from where Charles' property is to Mr. Morris, who I know well, came and told me the same exact thing you are telling me. He told me there were 30 young people out in the street, defying the people to come, he said he called, one police car came, he said he called again and said "you better send more than one car" and he said they did send another car. I told Mr. Morris today, as I will tell all of you, that I know the Chief's committed to cleaning up the area and their looking to putting patrol and the Bicycle Patrol, Community Police up there. But, you know you are absolutely right, I mean I've had juveniles, as I'm sure you all have as well, they taunt you, they threaten you, they taunt you, you know, what are you going to do to me and right in your face. It's a very difficult situation, it's a lack of respect, these people do not respect, that is a problem and I feel for all of you. We are sincerely working very diligently to address that Millville Gardens problem and that's something everyone of the Commissioners has made one of our top priorities. I also understand that when they couldn't come, you know, when they were talking about fixing your problem, your problem was the guy upstairs who wouldn't let them in, because it was leaking right into your downstairs, so it's not you who has the leak, it's above you, so we totally agree. We totally understand and I know the Chief will make sure that the Street Crimes Units up there, we are not letting these hoodlums take over our town. I'm telling you now and I'm proud of you for the way you stand up to people in what you do and I think for your people to be there and I feel for you, I truly do, in fact Mr. Morris asked me and I talked to the Chief early about trying to get video surveillance in that area you know because this has to be addressed, it absolutely does. I thank you Mr. Bell."

Charles Slaney: "I'm Charles Slaney, 29 W. Foundry Street, we would like to address the party as to what we can get done around the neighborhood in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward, it's more of a immediate problem what you realize, it's a ongoing thing, last night in particular I walked out in my yard, this being every night for the past two weeks that these boys have ganged-up and broken my windows out of my garage, I fix them, they come back they break them out again, now part of the problem is the teenagers that are doing it, but a big portion of it is the police officers that come and respond to the incident, they say it's only a matter of a five on duty, you ask them to pick up boys who are walking down the street with clubs, bricks, bottles breaking them all over the roadway, you ask them to at least address those boys and talk to them about an ordinance of

10 o'clock, they should be in and off the streets, they won't go talk to those people, they do not issue tickets, they do not talk to them, this gentleman here has been attacked several different times, by 20 or 30 or 50 individuals, this is something that is real serious, with bricks, bottles, clubs you name it and as far as even guns. I have to sit up until 4 or 5 o'clock in the morning, you don't realize it's a different City in the dark. You were out there today and you did explain you did see my garage windows, that's about the 4<sup>th</sup> time in the past 2 weeks. That's unacceptable and there's no reason for it because some of the boys that break them and the police come out, you point them out and they are not doing anything about it. I understand that their hands are tied, their peoples are few, but something absolutely has to be done. I had at least 6 of them out in my backyard last night, hiding in various different spots around in my yard, I walked out there just after taking a shower, because I saw 4 young girls out on the sidewalk being a little loud. These guys were stationed around my yard picking up red bricks to throw at me, they heard me phoning into the Police Station and decided to break my windows on the way out. Now, this happens every night usually between 10:30 and 10:45 PM. Obviously, they are violating curfew, they are also smart enough to know the police is making exchange at the time and can get away with it. When the police come to respond, all fine and dandy if they show red lights, but if they are not going to make some arrest when they get there this stuff is going to continue to go on and just not in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward, understand. It's generating through out the whole City and something desperately needs to be done. This gentleman back here, this is my brother-in-law and my sister, just last weekend about 25 or 30 young individuals about 16 to 10 years old busted him up busted his lip up, sliced his back up with a bicycle. About 15 or 20 officers responded to that call and nothing was done, further more they acted like he was the problem. Why? When they asked him what happen he went on to say it was all of them that jumped him with red bricks, clubs, bicycles, jumping on peoples cars surrounding the park, various other people complained it was all of them. They made no attempt to even talk to these people, which was only 50 feet away, they could have at least talked to them and encouraged some to tell the story, make some kind of arrest on these things. They need to get out there, that's a big problem. Now, I'm not going to wait and stand out in my backyard and wait for these people to kill me. I've already had my eye popped out of the socket with brass knuckles and 2 by 4's and I landed in the hospital for 2 weeks, now these people, now that was 5 some years ago, these people that are out there now, these youngsters are out there with guns and red bricks."

Mayor Quinn "I honestly think we could go on and on, I think what we need to do before you folks leave, the Chief is here, Director of Public Safety is here, I think that maybe with the Chief and the Director's permission maybe you go after the meeting, sit down and talk with them. Because, you know I understand I was there today, I've talked with your neighbors and even heard about tires being slashed all of the things you reiterate, so I know them to be true, because I saw the results of that talking to people. But, I think we need, you know the Chief has always been very responsible, the Street Crimes Unit and everything else what ever it takes to have people there, we got to do that and I think you need to sit down and discuss this and I certainly would be willing to stay also. I thank you for your time and also I wanted to tell you I think the good thing I see from this is you are certainly watching out for each others property. I know Mr. Morris talked to me today, I see the folks here he had mentioned, Henry he mentioned you, Charles and Mr. Bell has been very active in that area, that's a good thing. But, we have to be responsible, we absolutely have to

respond, we can not allow that type of stuff to go on. That's unacceptable in this City none of us will stand for that and assure you the Chief won't and anytime we had things like that he's been very, very pro-active and I'm sure he's going to be on this but like I said let's meet after if you like to and discuss with the Chief and Director. Charles, today I would like to tell you that there's a 1.3 million investment being made right behind you, across the street from you, of homes that are new homes that are going to be sold to individuals like yourselves and others who can come in there. First of all, that's going to improve so you are going to have more neighbors like the neighbors you have now that are going to be good people that are going to be homeowners who are going to care about their property. So, as I say to you, you have my word, we are working everyday on Millville Gardens. We know that there is a major problem in that area, we've stated it, we have been on record to do it, we are working very hard to try to resolve that problem in certain ways that we can. We haven't gotten there yet, but we are still working very hard to alleviate Millville Gardens as a problem, I know it's a lot to do."

Commissioner Shannon noted that lighting in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward is a priority and he is working with the Atlantic City Electric Company, the Police Department and the Parks Department with 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward lighting program as a targeted area.

Bruce Morris, Dock and Foundry Street addressed the Board of Commissioners and made the following comments:

"Bruce Morris, Jr., corner of Dock and Foundry, as of tonight when I just left, the asphalt in question has not been cleaned up. It is scattered all through the parking lot, from what I was told that it was being played upon and thrown today, I don't know if there was anymore damage done, nothing to my property, but I don't know about Charlie's or anybody else. But, something needs to be addressed, like I discussed with you Mayor today. We try to do our best to take care of the children in the community, there are several programs that are out there for the youth to me you know I'm involved with scouts a great organization. There are other programs that are out there, I have also heard you make the comment that there's any child out there that needs help with registration fees or whatever you take out of your pocket or there are other organizations that will sponsor these children. Something needs to be done, we are tired, it's a daily basis we are putting our lives and putting our family's lives in jeopardy every single night and it's ridiculous, it is totally ridiculous. Now, if we could possibly have the cameras put on the corners like we discussed it may alleviate some of the situation I don't know until they decide to figure out that there is a camera there and they break it. But, something needs to be done, something definitely needs to be done I mean it's totally ridiculous that we have to live like this. I'm sure if it was in your neighborhoods you guys wouldn't put up with it very long, you know we are tired. Like I said I've lived there since 1989 seen several changes in amongst the complex when I first moved in, it was great, great ownership, great manager they had another manager who came in there who was starting to do the right thing, back ground checks, all that good stuff, criminal background checks and they fired him. Why, because there was a drop in clientele, the place was almost three quarters vacant, it was beautiful. Something needs to be done, Eminent Domain, whatever needs to be done, something needs to be done with the place, you know I don't want to see Arnold lose his house, because he's a good neighbor, you know, but however, not everybody over there is like Arnold. If they were, you know, we all know it as well as everyone

else if there's a perfect world we wouldn't have a job would we, at least I wouldn't. Thanks for your time I just want to stay for the after meeting but I figured I'd make a public record."

Mayor Quinn: "Thanks, Bruce for informing me tonight, Bruce, because it was you that enlightened me to the information as I looked at Charlie's windows being broke out of his garage and you know. In fact, I do think that it's important that the Housing Authority go on, you should let them know that they're going to have problems there if they don't maybe bring security, as they're going through construction of these new homes..."

Michele Sunday Mills, 811 Archer Street, made the following comments:

"Michele Sunday Mills, 811 Archer Street, I just wanted to make you guys aware of what happen at City Park two weeks ago actually three weeks, it didn't have anything to do with this whole scenario even though Charles is my brother, we were down at the park. My husband works for the State, I work for the County, we are law abiding citizens, we have five children together. We were at City Park, he was playing basketball with our oldest son, there was a girl getting ready to fight a boy, teenager, who use to work for the midget football league. You know he's close with the kids and the children coming up, he tried to break up the fight, he told the girl not to fight, anyway she called her family, they came down, they ended up jumping him. Twenty-five to thirty kids were down there from 16 to 23 years old, 24 years old, there was witnesses, there was families, it was in the day light. These kids who came down there had pipes, they had 2 by 4's, they had bricks, they used the bike, they used the City trash can they used everything they could on him. I didn't think that he was going to live, I really didn't, there was witnesses down there screaming, you know, there were people climbing on other peoples cars not our car, there was babies, everybody was at the City Park. The whole group that was over there came over to jump on him just because he was trying to break up the fight and the girl wanted to fight the kid, regardless people stayed behind. There were different nationalities of all different families and they stayed behind to give reports to the police. The police never asked for a statement. They never asked for his address, they never asked if he wanted to go to the hospital when they arrived. They pretty much, he was bleeding from his mouth, his lip was split, he could have used stitches. He was hit in the back of his head, he had welts from the pipes that was hitting him, they never asked him to go to the hospital. They asked him well what happened to you, we said he got jumped, well why do you have a pipe in your hand asking him, you know, when they first arrived at the scene. They asked who all jumped you, they all did, they were running across the field. If you are familiar with City Park we were at the park side, they were running across the field to go back to the basketball courts. Well, you know, point out a few of them that was doing it, there was units I didn't even know Millville had that many police, they were coming from everywhere, they were over there, the one in the jersey, he was pointing out descriptions of the people, they said well we can...and I said well, why are you asking us these questions, why don't you go over there and ask them. Well, we have units over there, in the meantime them gentlemen, the ones that did the most damage left. They left the scene, they weren't arrested they weren't asked their names then they continued to ask him well why do you have a pipe in your hand. Well, this is the pipe they used on me. Well, why, what happened to you, why are you bleeding? You know they never said do you want to file a complaint. You know, they said, well ma'am we can't arrest everybody they have rights. You know, we are law abiding citizens, you know, we, I've never been arrested, he's never

been arrested, we've never, you know, done anything, you know, as far as dealing with the police or anything like that. The only reason I'm here tonight is because a lot of people at my job were frustrated with the whole scenario. There was people at the park that wanted to stay and give a report, the police never asked. When you're talking to them, you know, I didn't know if I should get their names, should I contact an attorney I didn't know what to do. You know, the police said if you do not leave now this park is closed, we've told you twice if you do not leave now we will make arrests, addressing it to us. At the same time these kids are all across there laughing and taunting us, you know, ahh you got jumped, the police aren't going to do anything, because there were so many and we get told, well, you know, they have rights, you can't just point to a group and say they all did it. They all did it, the witnesses were here, there was like three families staying behind saying that they all did it and they did nothing. You know, they hit my fifteen year old son, they jumped him from the back, he has braces, they hit him and I tell them that. They didn't ask to see him. My babies were in the car, I have a four year old and a six year old, there was a two year old in a car, there was a six month old baby from another family, there was a two year old little girl that was down there with her father. They were all there, they were all trying to get away. There was bricks flying the girl's car got damaged and still they never said, you know, do you want to sign a complaint, what is your name, what is your address and that makes citizens that are law abiding citizens want to go and do things that they wouldn't necessarily do. It's not fair. You know, they made it out like we were the one's that did something wrong and we did nothing we were just enjoying the day at the City Park and that leaves us to say we're not going to the City Park no more. We're not going to the parks in Millville and that's a shame, because I've lived here since I was five years old. Now, we're going to Vineland, I mean, it might seem minor to you, but it's very, very scary..."

Mayor Quinn: "No, it's not minor, I received a letter, it was anonymous, but it reiterates exactly everything you've just said. Someone who had witnessed it, one of those other families..."

Michele Mills: "they stayed behind..."

Mayor Quinn: "They wrote in letter exactly what you just said, now, but they were afraid to sign it, because of retaliation from the hoodlums who are in the park and that's what they said. No, we can't accept this and darn it you ought to have the right to go into that park anytime you want and enjoy that park with your family..."

Michele Mills: "my kids will not go back..."

Mayor Quinn: "none of us will stand for that, that's ridiculous."

??????: "What I want to say ?????? it's about to get hot, there's a lot of gang members around here now, as you well know and that park is going to be a ???? issue. You know, whether you see it or not, it's going to happen..."

Michele Mills: "it seemed like they did it before, because it was just they all came, they did it and then they left and they knew how to handled it. We didn't know how to handle it. We were standing there like, I didn't know what to do, it was fast enough, it wasn't fast enough for the police to get there. There was no help, he had nothing to help him. My kids are screaming, you know, they're yelling, they're trying to get out of the car and I'm trying

to protect them along with other families and their cars were damaged when they were trying to hit him with bricks. I mean he had gashes in his head, he had his lip split, he had a stab in his side. The cops never asked, they didn't care. I assume, I mean, I shouldn't assume, but I assumed that they just figure oh, well, you know, let them kill each other. It sounds crazy and I shouldn't feel that way, but that's how it was down there. I mean I can understand it, I can relate in some sense, because you see, it was all black youth and it shouldn't be that way, but it was all black youth that was down there, but my husband is black also, not that it makes a difference, but it does. Because, when they came down there, I mean, he might have a bald head, he might look rough, he might have tattoos, but he's not and he's a law abiding citizen and he's working for the State and he still, it seemed like he had no rights. My kids have nightmares, he didn't go to the hospital that night, because he was scared that they would retaliate and come to our home, so you know, I guess I could have done a lot of things differently, we had a few names and we did tell the police, nothing was done. The only one person that was arrested was the one that threatened the police and said that he would kill all the police, that's the only one that got arrested. The one's that threatened and jumped on him and beat him, you know, did nothing."

????? "what I want to get to is that I don't know how many police officers we have in the daytime or whatever, but as soon as it gets hot, if you don't have somebody not hourly just riding through, because they know when the cops come, they know forty-five minutes went by and we got this much time. If you don't have somebody parked out there for the hours that park is open, there's going to be a problem, a very bad problem. That's all I have to say."

Rich deAlmeida addressed the Board of Commissioners noting the next 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward meeting is to be held on April 27, 2006 at Wood School and urged anyone interested to please attend.

There being no further comments Mayor Quinn declared the public comment portion closed and made the following comment:

"First of all, Lois and Gail, I want to thank you for the effort that you put forward for the residents of Cedarville Road and I'm glad that it worked out. It was finally government listening to the people. Which is a good thing and we need to say, you know, it's the old story we're from government how can we help and the people laugh at you and in this case, you help set a good situation and we're glad that was resolved. I thank the two of you and all of the other people who work so hard to plead your case, you did a great job and congratulations on that. I'm sorry I didn't catch your names...Joanne and Herman, I will personally, tomorrow, talk to Mr. Ayres. First of all, I do not condone, nor does anyone up here, the good old boys network. You can't have a double standard, if you're getting ticketed and you've given us a list of all these places where these buses are then that has to be addressed, because that's not fair. We do try to be fair and that is not acceptable, because that shows that we're not, something is not being done. I will sit down with him tomorrow morning and discuss these other locations with him and I will personally drive around to these location and we'll take a look at that, because he comes under my department with zoning and I will certainly find out what is going on and why these things are occurring. Okay, we can't hold a two-way conversation, because you're not on the mic, but you can talk to me afterwards if you would like. But, I understand what you said, I've listed the places that you've given me, I will address this with him tomorrow and I will personally drive by these places to

verify that they are still there and then it's going to be up to him to take action, because that is not acceptable, that is not acceptable. Anybody else who would like to say something, I think my blood pressure is probably up a little bit tonight."

Commissioner Parent: "Calm down, Mayor, we'll get there. I think Charlie just left with Henry and Bruce and the people in the Third Ward. We understand and recognize the problems we have out there, especially at Millville Gardens. But, I have to defend our Police Department and always will. We've made a number of arrests, especially in that Third Ward, with our Streets Crime Unit, our Narcotics Units, our Police Department. I don't know what happened at the park down there, that's something that I will definitely address along with the Chief. I know it concerns the Chief on why arrests were not made, we are really gearing ourselves up for the summer. We also recognize and understand that these children who are out there, who are a bunch of wannabes, that's what I call them, who just want to disrupt good law abiding citizens in our City. The Mayor indicated this will not be tolerated, I assure you it will not be tolerated. I don't care what we have to do to take care of these juveniles, we're going to not only come after the juveniles, we're going to come right after the parents, we're getting tired of being the babysitters for their kids and we're going to start coming after the parents, because that's what we're going to be doing. I know our patrols are out there, we'll continue to make arrests and things that were said tonight are unacceptable, unacceptable to this Administration, to this Commission and to the Police Department, to those people who work hard at City Hall. We'll continue to be out there in force. We are putting on more Police Officers, this Administration recognizes that, we've started last year in hiring new Police Officers. It takes almost a year before we get them back into the streets. The thing that is encouraging and the things that I like to hear this evening was that when you called we responded. That's the key. Someone made mention that there's only five police officers and in the same tone a phone call came in that we had twenty police cars out there. We assure you that we have a lot of police officers in our City. We are implementing the bicycle routes that will be out there, police officers will be out there on bikes in the neighborhoods, we'll have walking patrol in the neighborhoods. But, you know the hard thing is it's costing the law abiding taxpayers the money to put more Police Officers on. So, we're going to make the parents pay for it. That's the avenue that we're going to go into, I'll be working with the judge and the prosecutor, whatever we have to do, we will do. We recognize the gangs that are out there. The days have gone by that we are that naïve not to think that these hoodlums want to be in control. We know what the problems they have in the school system, it's not just on our streets it's in our schools also. So, this Administration has made that promise, we'll continue doing it, but we need your help. That's the bottom line. We can't be the eyes and ears twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. Give us a call, take part in those neighborhood meetings, you know we hope to see you folks there at the Third Ward Meetings and we'll just continue doing what we have to do. Chief Harvey, as a Chief, as a person, is deeply concerned about what's happening. He's addressing it, we meet on a regular basis together on these problems that we have in our neighborhoods. We're working with the Council, the Neighborhood Council on matters that are important to all of us. I've said it before and I'll keep saying it, the one thing that the people of this City want is a safe and clean community and that's what we're going to try and keep going after. Regarding what we discussed about putting on and hiring even more Police Officers, we just have to do it folks, we have to do it to maintain peace and harmony throughout this City. You as a law abiding citizen have that right,

you deserve that right to be able to sit outside on your porch, to have your children go to a park and enjoy yourself. There's a lot of great things happening in this City and we're not going to let a bunch of wannabe's try to ruin it. I guarantee you that. So, lets join together and I think together we can solve the problems, it won't be zero tolerance out there, you know, as far as the rights of individuals, but I guarantee the Chief will do what he has to do to get out there and come as close to zero tolerance as we possibly can. Thanks for being here tonight, thanks for coming, we'll do what we can."

Mayor Quinn: "Any other Commissioners?"

Vice-Mayor Derella: "Yes, Mr. Mayor in regards to Millville Gardens, I know that our Department, Inspections and Permits, reacts to every phone call that comes in for any kind of concern. I know that they've responded to Mr. Bell in the past. We did react to the article in the paper, we did not get a call in regards to the leak and to the refrigeration issue that was cited, but anytime we see something like that in the paper we immediately make our way out there. Mr. Bell did allow us to come into his apartment and we followed up on those two issues and concerns and were given reports on what was being done and what had been done prior to that article in the paper. We also take the time on a monthly basis, as often is allowed to do spot inspections and try to get into apartments. The public has to understand that we cannot walk into a property. We have to knock and we have to be allowed to enter the property by the tenant. The only other time we can enter the property is if we give, if the landlord gives twenty-four hour notice for our inspections and then we can enter the property with the landlord and/or the tenant being with us. There are other situations when the police enter apartments due to their job and requirements, they will contact one of our inspectors, we have them on call twenty-four hours a day, they rotate, but we have entered properties, because the police have noted safety issues, whether it be smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors, all those issues are safety that can be acted upon immediately by an inspector. Other things are unsanitary conditions, broken pipes, sewage issues and things of that nature. Currently on site at Millville Gardens there are two full buildings that are shut down and they've been shut down for over a year and CO's will not be given, because they cannot make the repairs that are needed and that had to do with unsanitary conditions. The apartments that we did see two weeks ago of the ones we got in, three were in very, very good condition for a building that's what sixty or seventy years old, roughly. So, again, the standards that are set by the BOCA Code of the City of Millville has set forth and must follow are the bare minimums, unfortunately, it's not the kind of conditions that some of us would agree with, but that's the code we need to follow and I will stress, we act on every call that comes in. We also have the owners of Millville Gardens in court again. We have had them in court on several occasions and we will continue to do so. We will pursue every avenue possible to make sure that the living conditions there are appropriate. Over the years, Mr. Morris was correct there's been several attempts for improvements over the variety of different owners that have been there. The one's that have been most aggressive, if you look at the photo's from 1997 until now, siding, windows, exterior things that have been done. Again, as cost effective as possible, the problem is the ownership has changed three times and we need to be aggressive. We have an Ordinance in place that lists a nuisance property. We feel that is a nuisance, it's very hard to take a property to court regarding that, there's been over three hundred calls to the police in the last year. We recognize the issue and we are attacking it as aggressively as possible. Inspectors ride by the exterior of the

property every week and send violations as noted, whether it be trash, whether it be weeds, whether it be a cracked window, whether it be paint that needs to be scraped and we continually follow-up on that on a regular basis. But, it takes time, we've got to give them so many days based on what the violation is, so we are aggressively pursuing it, unfortunately, within the law that we have to follow. As far as Third Ward, they've probably been the leader in the City of Millville in regards to their Neighborhood Council Acts, they have been very, very aggressive for the entire time we've been in office, which is now our third term. The City Commission has been very responsive and we need to continue to be responsive. We have had lights changed there Commissioner Shannon does by neighborhood, by neighborhood and goes after those things. There have been lighting improvements. There have been several buildings torn down in that neighborhood, there's a street sweeping program that goes on in that neighborhood. We've replaced sidewalks on major projects, we've paved roads, we've paved alleys, we've done several things over the years to try to continually upgrade that property. The one thing we have no control over is people. The only control we have there is you reporting it and our Police Department being as aggressive as possible and that's what we need to do. I do encourage people in the Third Ward. You do have one of the most active, the most active groups there, actually the group that led the way to all of the other neighborhood groups. Mr. deAlmeida, Rich, is very, very active and I'll tell you what, not a guy more visible in the neighborhood other than Debra Reed walking. They send complaints, they send issues that they see to my attention on fax machines and we act on it that way. There's a lot of things that are in place that you need to know about that's going on in your neighborhood. You're active now, continue to do it, because we'll be there to support you."

There being no further comments the meeting was adjourned subject to the call of the chair, by the following vote. Yeas: Shannon, Parent, Hollingshead, Derella and Quinn.
